Does This Make Me Look Fat?

Dogs never ask this question. They don't care so they will happily eat whatever you give them or what they can get with no regard for their waistline. It is up to us, their families, to keep an eye on their weight. This might be one of the most important things we can do to keep our beloved pets healthy. Yet, it appears that so many of us fail at this task. The number of dogs that present as overweight is staggering. This is especially a problem with big dogs and Goldens in particular, because of their general predilection for hip dysplasia...and food. Extra weight puts enormous stress on their hind quarters and can create unnecessary problems. It can also put extra stress on their hearts, making them lethargic. The more lethargic they become, the less active they are, thus creating a vicious cycle. Obesity can also increase the chances of arthritis, liver disease, diabetes, and it can even increase the risk of getting certain types of cancer.

Unlike many canine medical conditions, obesity is a totally avoidable condition and is 100% in our control. Your vet may tell you if your dog is overweight, but the reality is we should already know this ourselves. A good vet will certainly let you know during any visit, but if you ignore their advice, they will likely politely stop talking about it. Not paying attention to weight and letting them pack it on is essentially killing them with kindness (food/treats).

Weighing your dog at every vet visit is essential and you should compare the weights each time. An easy way to tell if your dog is overweight is simply by sight and feel.

The ribs should be palpable and covered by minimal amounts of fat. When viewed from above, the dog's waistline should be visible by a subtle inward curve behind the ribs. A side view should reveal an abdominal tuck or a slight upward curve of the belly behind the ribs. Overweight dogs will have excess fat covering the ribs and will lack a noticeable waistline or abdominal tuck.

It is also possible that if you are struggling to keep their weight down that there may be a thyroid condition. Your vet can check this and either rule it out or provide medication if necessary.

Your vet can tell you what your dog's ideal weight should be. Once you have that, and if it is determined that your dog is overweight, it is an act of kindness to get serious about a diet and exercise program. Check your dog's weight regularly. You can pop into your vet's office any time without an appointment just to get them weighed.

Many dog food manufacturers over-prescribe the amount of food you should feed your Golden. How much you should feed varies wildly depending on their metabolism and activity level, so your vet can help you determine the right amount. On average, female Goldens weigh between 55 and 65 lbs and male Goldens weigh between 65 and 75 lbs. Generally, females should get around two cups a day and males should get 3-3.5 cups, but again this varies according to age and activity level. Your vet will help you get to the right amount and even this might need experimentation to reach and maintain the perfect weight.

Simply put, if your dog needs to lose weight, **FEED THEM LESS** and **EXERCISE THEM MORE**,



if possible. For some reason, many of us think it's cruel to deprive our pets. The opposite is true. We are the only ones who can control their weight and it is not only a kindness to keep their weight under control but an absolute health necessity.

There are many foods that your Golden will enjoy that are not high in calories and can be used as a substitute for high calorie treats, such as carrots, bananas, watermelon, blueberries, cauliflower, apples, and oranges...to name a few. These can also be added to their meals to add bulk without adding calories.

No, your Golden will never ask "Does this make me look fat?" but a Golden at their ideal weight will be happier, healthier, and more active. They will never stop asking for more food or treats and they will never stop trying to guilt you into feeding them more by flashing their sad doe-eyes. It is our job, however, to stay firm. If you have to capitulate, give them a couple of small carrots. Some Goldens consider these veggie alternatives as 'sissy food'. If your Golden is like that then try wrapping the carrot in a little yoghurt. If that doesn't work, just try to ignore those sad hypnotic eyes. Remember, it's all for a good health cause.

When You Feel Like You Failed

It has taken me years to be able to even consider writing about this. Even now, I feel my eyes stinging as the shame creeps up while I remember my failed attempt at rescuing a Golden many years ago. It was pre-COVID (the dividing line of life these days) and we had a 'unicorn' of a Golden who we adopted from an acquaintance. Rosie had bounced around many homes already and we were stunned at how perfectly she behaved. Aside from some leash-pulling, she had no bad habits, despite likely having never been formally trained. With us, she was with her forever family. With this happy situation, why not add another Golden?

We contacted Golden Rescue, who conducted our home visit and interview and saw that we had an ideal spot and friendly girl to welcome a new Golden into our life. We were connected with a Golden preparing to arrive in Canada from Egypt and fell in love at first (picture) sight. We picked Riley up from the airport and he was understandably nervous, but so very sweet. But shortly after bringing him home, I knew I was in over my head. My anxiety was through the roof as we tried to help Riley adapt to life in a new country and a new home. With time, I am sure that he would've settled in just fine, but having two dogs was more than I could handle. I was devastated when I realized I had overestimated my capacity. I suffer from an anxiety disorder, but even with my ongoing

treatment, my mental health had shattered. I contacted Golden Rescue and, through sobs, explained my predicament. I was deeply ashamed. The volunteer I spoke to was incredibly kind and understanding and assured me this is not an abnormal situation, that we don't know until we try, and that I was doing the right thing by contacting them to find a better home for Riley. A few days later, a transport volunteer came to pick him up to take to his new home. Again, while sobbing, we handed over his leash as the volunteer again reassured us that everything was okay, these things happen, and he was going to a loving family. I followed up a few months later to see how he was doing and he had settled nicely and his new family was thrilled to have him.


To this day, I feel such guilt over what I see as giving up on a beautiful Golden soul. But I am comforted with the knowledge that he has brought joy to another family and that there are people like Golden Rescue volunteers to take care of not only these pups, but the people who love them and want the best for them. My message to anyone in a similar predicament is to trust your gut for what is best for you and your Golden and to trust in the wonderful team at Golden Rescue to help you through the process.







Volunteer Coordinators ~ Across Canada


Help with the success of our events by recruiting and scheduling volunteers. We will give you all the tools and support you need to make our events a success.

A few fresh, clean, flexible trimmings can be harmless; however, the Barn Veterinarian would say: 1) hoof trimmings can hold harmful bacteria, 2) hoof trimmings can splinter and perforate the gut wall, and 3) hoof trimmings can also hold poisonous residue from a horse being treated for thrush on the underside of the foot.

Dear Goldie: My PPs (Pet Parents) are obsessed with their cell phones. I'm confused! How come no one is allowed to use or even look at their phones during family mealtimes, but the minute I'm on a walk, the cell phones immediately come out as a PP priority. I'm no longer special and no one


