

Ask Goldie

Dear Goldie: My mom and dad like me to drop one quickly first thing in the morning. I try my best to hear 'good boy' but too often, all I can think is 'what a bummer...nothing's happening here'. So, mom started adding this orange stuff called 'bumpkin' I think, into my food. And now I can sing the TV song 'plop, plop, good job...oh, what a relief it is!' **Dropper Dave**

Dear Dave: It's always a good idea to have a can of pure pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling) on hand. Pumpkin contains fibre, tastes good, and gets things moving (about 1 tbsp with dinner). Pumpkin can be frozen once open and used as needed. It also works to combat bouts of mild diarrhea. It's truly great stuff!

Dear Goldie: Ask me "Howl you doin?" and I'll say "Not good". I have big time anxiety, the shakes, and I fear most everything. We saw the Petrinarian to see if anything was pawsible to ease my stress, and yes, result! Just by swallowing one new treat a day, I was finally

able to relax, stay calm, and sleep through the night. I was happy. I also realized for the first time just how nice the mailman is and he even said I was lovely and calm for a change. But now the daily treat I so looked forward to is gone and I'm a mess again. **Anxiously Awaiting Your Response Agnus**

Dear Agnus: Sometimes owners discontinue anxiety medication too soon as a reaction to 'the new you'. However, many Goldens settle, thrive, and live happier lives by taking medication to ease severe anxiety issues. I would suggest another visit to your vet to receive reassurance on the usual transition process and to gain additional guidance on medication options, dosage, and minimal/ acceptable side effects. It's also important to learn how to wean off medications to avoid set-backs.

Dear Goldie: This is the dog's truth, I swear. Last week, after my walk, I rode in the back seat as usual, licking the salt off my black rubber boots. When I got out of the car, dad said "Oh, you lost a boot!" Two days later, I flomitted up a big one! Dad exclaimed "What is that?" Well, it was my boot from two days ago. It was flat and massive, at three times its usual size. Meanwhile I had been eating and pooping just like normal. Could this have been serious? **Sly Guy**

Dear Guy: You are a lucky boy indeed! A swallowed rubber balloon boot may pass through your digestive tract uneventfully or be vomited up as it did in your case. However, it could also cause a complete or partial obstruction, requiring surgery. Owners should always keep rubber balloon boots out of reach when not in use and closely supervise their Golden when the boots are in use.

Dear Goldie: Now I know what you gonna say about hairnets or is it harnesses on Goldens, but don't worry, I always wear one. Problem is that I'm a big boy and weigh almost the same as mom. I'm sweet by nature but I forgot myself yesterday at the park when two dogs were off leash. I wanted to play too and took off. My mom couldn't hang on and fell down. It was fun 'til I panicked and ran across the busy street by the park. Feeling Paw-ful for mom! **Puffy Pete**

Dear Pete: This was a tricky and scary situation. Unleashed dogs running in the park are becoming more common which raises huge concerns. I'm sure your owner will be extra vigilant next time in visually scoping out the park and perhaps avoiding entry altogether. Some ball play in your yard before walkies could also be a means of dialing down your Golden energy.

BEHIND-THE-SCENES AT GOLDEN RESCUE

The AMAZING Intake Team

The natural first stop on our 'Behind-the-Scenes' tour of Golden Rescue is with the Intake Team. How do these beautiful Goldens come into contact with Golden Rescue and what is the process for starting their journey to their forever family? There is a lot more to this than you may have initially thought. The dedicated volunteers involved in this process must be organized, available, empathetic, and ready for whatever situation may come their way.

There is a myriad of reasons why a Golden finds their way to Golden Rescue. People move, pass away, have financial difficulties, etc. There are also those who are abandoned or found in deplorable conditions. Golden Rescue gets the word out to shelters, veterinarians, and other rescue organizations to contact them when a Golden needs rescuing. When a call comes in, there are often difficult conversations that our Intake Team must navigate ~ sad stories of abused or neglected pups or people who are heartbroken to have to part with their Golden because of life circumstances. It takes a very special person to manage these situations and, fortunately, Golden Rescue has a fabulous team right across Canada. The volunteers work week-long 'shifts' where they are on-call for anyone with a Golden in need and can sometimes spend up to 12 hours a day managing incoming calls and emails.

Once a Golden in need has been identified, the intake volunteer gets to work gathering as much information as they can about the Golden to complete the surrender form ~ their personality,

diet, health challenges, behavioural quirks. A conversation can take an hour (or more, particularly with bonded pairs). Photos are also requested...just in case there is a little confusion about what a Golden Retriever is (and no dog is left to flounder ~ Golden Rescue always refers to an appropriate rescue organization to assist). It's not always just a one-time chat either as many people are reluctantly surrendering their Golden due to life circumstances and aren't always ready for this step. Our volunteers listen, provide information about how Golden Rescue can help, and assist people to make this often-difficult decision. These can be very personal conversations and the Intake Team always remains non-judgemental, compassionate, and objective. People are frequently surprised to find out that there is an organization like Golden Rescue that will take care of their Golden with no need to leave them at a shelter, and with such thoughtfulness to where they will live both temporarily and permanently.

If the Golden is ready to be taken into our care and it has been determined that they are not a risk (viciousness must be ruled out, as we can't put our fosters or adopters at risk). Fortunately, this only happens in <1% of cases. The next step is matching the Golden with a foster family. The volunteers agree this can be the most difficult part of the role, as there are specific needs that some Goldens have and geographical challenges.



The AMAZING Intake Team continued...

We have many incredible foster families across Canada, but we always need more! The intake volunteer provides all the information gathered to the Foster Team, and an eblast message goes out to the foster families with the details of what is needed. In an emergency, direct calls to the closest home may also be necessary. Once the right foster family has been identified, the intake volunteer connects with the Transportation Team to get the Golden moved to the foster family. Sometimes this is a short drive, other times it's a flight across the country (yes, there are incredible charities with pilots that do this!).

Next is one of the most important steps, and that is getting the Golden to a veterinarian. No Golden can be in pain (and we know their stoicism and happy demeanour can mask their pain). Golden Rescue has wonderful veterinarians who work with us to take care of these sweet, furry souls. New Goldens get a wellness check (full exam from snout to tail, vaccines, bloodwork) and any health needs are immediately addressed (spaying or neutering is a must). The Intake Team discusses with the Veterinary Liaison and Foster Contacts what the Golden needs...a different diet, leash training, to name a few...so that the foster family can immediately implement next steps. Goldens can stay with their foster families for a few weeks or a few months until they find their forever family. There will be more on our foster team in next month's issue!

Despite all the challenges and sad stories that come along with this role, the volunteers all agree that seeing a Golden go to a loving home makes everything absolutely worth it. They all have incredible stories of Goldens making amazing recoveries or bonding with a new person



who needs them. Each and every rescue story is meaningful ~ it impacts the owners, the foster families, the volunteers, and the adopting families.

For these Goldens, it's not a happy ending, it's a happy beginning!

We are profoundly grateful to our amazing Intake Team ~ it is demanding and highly-charged and takes passion, resilience, and a positive attitude. Every one on the team has a 'we will prevail' perspective.

Anxious Human + Anxious Dog = ?

Studies have shown that cuddling with a furry friend can help reduce anxiety and stress (hence the many programs to bring therapy dogs to schools and hospitals). But what if you AND your dog both suffer from clinical anxiety? Studies also show that dogs react to human emotions and can feel when we are stressed. As someone with an anxiety disorder who adopted a dog who also has anxiety, how does this work?

Are you making your dog anxious? Is your dog making you anxious? Are you in an endless cycle of causing each other's anxiety, therefore perpetuating a 'what came first, the chicken or the egg' conundrum?

I have spent the past year and a half trying to work this out with Scout #4497. He came to our home at two years of age with an unknown past and some odd behaviours. He stands up and 'hugs' us when he's stressed. He cries, paces, barks, and looks for anything to destroy when we aren't home (and a crate is not an option, as we learned when he busted the metal door off its hinges while we were out for 30 minutes). We can also sense his anxiety when other dogs pass us in the street, even though he has happily met many dogs.

Of course, this means that I am on constant high-alert during our walks or when he is running around our fenced yard (as you don't want to be

a small critter anywhere back there). I constantly check the camera we turn on in the house when we leave to see if he is okay or if he is crying. I worry about how we will travel with him, since he gets stressed in the car and new environments. I lose sleep after he has eaten something he is not supposed to, hoping his stomach isn't blocked and he's not feeling nauseous (and this is all about 'me' because my husband has a preternaturally calm disposition so nothing rattles him). Scout and I would both like a scientific examination of his brain to find out how his works.

Dogs are supposed to CURE my anxiety, not CAUSE it. Is he feeling my stress and it's amping up his cortisol levels? I try very hard to relax and use all of my therapy techniques to exude calm (all while my heart is pounding and my mind is racing). Somehow, he can feel my anxiety but he can't feel my (attempted) calmness. I have worked with trainers on counter-conditioning and slowly helping Scout acclimate to being alone (just as I have worked with my therapist to condition myself to not worry so much about Scout). I have worked with our veterinarian with medications to help him feel calmer (as I have worked with my doctor to find medication to help me relax). I would say we have made incremental progress – and I will take any progress I can get.

Scout and I will continue on this journey together with the support of our network of friends, family, and professionals. Luckily, another thing we have in common is enjoying a nice cuddle at the end of the day, and while it doesn't cure our anxiety, I think science would show it certainly gives us at least a few moments of peace.




