He was anemic and 15 pounds underweight, had doggie nightmares daily, didn't wag his tail, never barked (still doesn't), and seemed to be overly quiet and slightly traumatized (had a terrible wound on his head), wouldn't go in or near the water, and didn't know what to do if you threw a ball or frisbee. He has certainly slowed down considerably and sleeps a lot, but he still loves to go for his walk every day and he knows every dog in the neighbourhood and every neighbour too, especially if they have treats! He's a big dog at 100 pounds and could seem threatening to some. Instead, he is the calmest, quietest, gentlest, most patient, affectionate boy we have ever known. A Tale of Two Tails

Casey #2362 & Alli #2363

We chose June 1st, 2016 as their birthdays ~ the day we picked them up in Toronto. We will never forget how touching it was to pick them up at the airport, seeing them arrive in their crates. Our hearts were breaking ~ we were crying with joy. They were so good in the car on our two-day drive from Toronto to Halifax.

Sadly, we had to put Casey to sleep on August 15th. He had lost so much weight and would no longer eat. He was also finding it difficult to walk. Our vet said he was suffering and we couldn't let him be in pain. We cried so much as we hated to lose him. He was totally deaf and basically slept most of the day. He would have been 14 or 15, as we had him nine years. We gave him a very loving home and spoiled him rotten. He was our baby and we miss him dearly. We had him cremated with his blanket and stuffy and his ashes are sitting on the shelf. Once Alli passes, we will mix their ashes together so they can always be together.

Alli is slowly adjusting to being alone. They were never apart and this is very hard on her too. We still have Casey's bed in our bedroom and Alli will go smell it and have a short nap, then move to her own bed. I think it's comforting to her. His collar and leash are still hanging on the hook with Alli's ~ we don't have the heart to take them away.

Alli is now 12 or 13 and pretty healthy. She has a sebaceous cyst on her back. We had it tested and it is not cancerous. Our vet recommended we just leave it alone as it's not hurting her. She is always up on the couch with us and we cuddle and talk about Casey.



When we first got them, Alli became very sick, and after sending her case to the Atlantic Veterinary College in PEI, it was discovered she had ECOLI in her lungs and was not expected to live. After excellent care, she remarkably survived. The vet couldn't believe the commitment Golden Rescue had to these pups ~ she was totally amazed.

Alli still goes on her daily walks with Ray, not very far, but just enough to give her a little exercise and she loves it. We have a large fenced yard where they enjoyed the freedom to run and play. Surprisingly, they didn't take to water. We have a pool and often took them in to cool off but they swam directly over to the steps and out they went. We're guessing they were never exposed to water in Istanbul.

Alli and Casey were always together. We're so glad you didn't separate them. Looking back, they were like glue. Casey definitely was the alpha, always looking out for her. Being seniors, they had our full attention ~ they are our children.

Speaking of children, they were excellent with our grandchildren. We have seven and they live in three different provinces. The pups have always been showered with kisses and hugs from them. We never had to worry about their temperament ~ always gentle. Not once have they ever showed any aggression. We think they had such a bad start in life that they thrived on being loved and

cared for. They knew they were safe and would never experience the trauma they had living on the streets. We often think of how rough and scary it must have been for them. I'm sure they would not have survived if GR had not intervened.

They sure love their treats. No wonder they are a little on the heavy side. They get a treat every time they go out and have a pee. They have never been deprived of food at our place. We took them to puppy classes when we first got them and they learned basic commands and how to walk on a leash. They also picked up the English language very quickly. Casey is always so protective of Allie whenever another dog comes around. There is a lot of barking and posturing. He's guarding his lady.

We have travelled over the years and they went to a kennel where the dogs played all day together. It was just like a mini vacation for them too. We were always so anxious to get home and shower them with hugs and kisses. You might think we are crazy, but they are our life. Our life would have been so empty without them.

We can't thank Golden Rescue enough for allowing us to adopt Alli and Casey. They were a perfect match. We assure you Alli will be very much loved for her remaining years with us. She is a doll, as was Casey. They brought so much happiness into our lives. We highly recommend Golden Rescue to anyone thinking of adopting. These Goldens have been through hell and you can tell they are grateful to have been rescued. No dog should have to go through trauma like that. We are very lucky to have been blessed with these two beautiful pups who will forever have a very special place in our hearts as well as those of our families. 

Is Your Dog A Jumper?

Is your dog greeting every guest to the house with two front paws to the chest? Imagine coming home from a long day at work and all you really want to do is relax. Unfortunately, your faithful yet unruly pet has other ideas and practically tackles you to the floor the moment you enter the door. Sound familiar? Well, if so, you are like many others whose precocious pooches have not yet learned to curb their jumping ways.

WHY DO DOGS JUMP? There are some dog breeds that are genetically built for jumping. They have a natural ability and inclination to jump. Dogs also jump because they learn it is rewarding. The owner carries the dog around in their arms or has them up on the couch, chairs, and bed, which in turn elevates the dog's status, making them think that is where they belong all of the time. The dog then assumes a more dominant role in the household, showing less respect towards its owner who is seen by them as subordinate and beneath them in status and importance in the household. So, when the dog is jumping up on people what they are really saying is, "Pay attention to me...hug me...love me...NOW!" in a rude and demanding manner ~ one they have come to expect that has been met with an immediate response. Dogs are quite used to routine and schedule and if you are routinely inviting them up on you for hugs or having them up on furniture, they get used to being elevated and in turn begin to demand it in the form of inappropriate behaviour like jumping or barking. They have learned from you that this is a sign of affection. And as soon as they see you, they will start jumping up to get your attention. Essentially, they are saying, "Look at me, look at me, pet me,

pet me!" because this is how they have learned to best get your attention.

WHAT CAN YOU DO? Preventative options include avoiding creating the behaviour in the first place. You can do this by beginning your relationship with your new dog by NOT allowing them up on beds and couches or inviting them up constantly. Instead, get down on their level to play, just as we would with a toddler. We must let them BE a dog, as opposed to treating them like a teddy bear or princess who has the run of the house. Good manners are just as important for your dog as they are for you or your children. And instilling them in our dogs is our responsibility as pet owners.

HOW DO YOU ELIMINATE THE JUMPING ONCE IT HAS BECOME ESTABLISHED? The most important thing you must do is often the hardest for many owners and that is to IGNORE the behaviour when it happens. When your dog is demonstrating this kind of rude behaviour, you must immediately stop petting and talking to your dog or interacting with them in any way until they stop jumping. You ONLY give them love and attention when they are ON THE GROUND. This is often extremely tough for us humans because many times we don't even know that it's going on. The dog comes to our side while we're distracted and bumps into us or jumps up on us, invading our personal space, and we let them. We find our hand automatically and instinctively reaching out to the dog and petting them without even realizing we are doing it. And what this does is reward the dog's rude behaviour thus ensuring they will repeat it again and more frequently



in the future. Instead, the first thing you have to do is recognize what rude behaviour is and stop encouraging it. And then start positively reinforcing good behaviour such as when the dog is NOT jumping up or climbing on furniture you can have your dog lie down at your feet on a comfy mat or dog bed and give them lots of love and pets for being good. Your dog will learn to love this reaction from you so much more than what they get when they are constantly harassing and jumping on you. Another great technique is to use your body language to send a message to your dog using the universal 'go away' signal where you stand up tall when your dog is jumping on you, keeping your arms crossed in front of you

and your head and nose turned up and away from your dog. This tells your dog that you clearly want them to stop their unruly behaviour and that their jumping is unwelcome.

A professional would also be helpful as they can put the dog and owner through some quick behavioural training exercises where a specific practice exercise is created to eliminate your dog's unruly jumping, and from this they ultimately learn to sit and wait patiently for your attention and not jump and accost you in your personal space.




A Tail of Two Goldens

"It was the best of times. It was the worst of times."

Dickens sure got it right when you think of this story of two Goldens ~ Blondie and Penelope. These beautiful girls were part of a huge rescue mission that started in Winnipeg (GR rescued 25 Goldens from a Manitoba backyard breeder). This was to be the 'best of times' for Blondie and Penelope as they were rescued from deplorable conditions. The 'worst of times' was when these girls escaped during a transport exchange in the Sudbury area. After such a long journey, rather than being safely housed with a foster family, these girls got out and found themselves in unfamiliar dangerous territory.

GR's search and rescue team, led by Lynn Harding, sprang into action, to find the girls and get them to safety. Fortunately, Blondie stayed in the area and the live trap set up to catch them was ultimately successful in capturing Blondie but it took three nerve-wracking, exhausting weeks.

Unfortunately, Penelope was another story. She fled the immediate area after being spooked by gun shots by hunters. It was confirmed that she had crossed the river and ended up in Atikameksheng Anishnawbek Lands. The volunteer team worked in conjunction with cottage owners and members of the nearby community to establish cameras and feeding stations but after two weeks they were convinced Penelope was no longer in the immediate area.

Days turned into weeks and weeks turned into months and although the team had several sightings, they were unsuccessful getting Penelope into the live traps. The days became

bitterly cold and New Year's fireworks didn't help as they no doubt spooked Penelope and the team lost sight of her for days. Hope was starting to vanish but the team stayed vigilant. Drones, cameras, live traps, and a host of volunteers still weren't enough to capture poor Penelope. Finally, after 149 days Penelope was secured on February 22nd to the hugest sigh of relief.

Without going into great detail, these amazing volunteers endured incredible hardships over the 149 days but this harrowing story had a happy ending thanks to the tireless efforts of so many.



We did not see this coming. We have volunteered with Golden Rescue for over four years and one of the rewarding things we do is transport needy Goldens. Our own rescue story started this way. We received a request to transport a little girl to her foster. It was a Saturday morning and we immediately headed out to pick her up. We were told that this little treasure was just over a year old and had been dropped off at a pet store in terrible condition. She came from a puppy mill, lived in a barn, and since she did not breed, she was discarded. She was scared, shaking, extremely skittish, and bleeding around the neck. The wound was from a half-healed, infected dog bite and she was in need of immediate medical attention. Arrangements were made for us to take her to an emergency hospital so off we went. We waited almost four hours and I sat on the floor with her and she climbed up on my lap and stayed there the entire time. I could see how comfortable and safe she felt and I knew she could feel my love. It was late in the evening by the time we met the foster. We jokingly told him not to bond with her as we would be back to pick her up. Well, we had to move heaven and earth that evening. We filled out the Golden Rescue adoption application and did not sleep at all that night. We were so excited to hear back if we were able to adopt this little angel, waiting patiently for the morning call. We were given the thumbs up and we could not get there fast enough. Peter and I had another rescued

Golden, Lexy who was about to get a sister. We were so happy that this little angel was coming home with us and was going to meet her big sister. We arrived home with a hungry pup and our love story was about to begin. We named her Kyla and she seemed to like her name right away. Lexy and her took a few weeks to get fully acquainted with a few bumps along the way but once Lexy figured out that Kyla was not going anywhere, they soon became best friends and allies. That evening she got her first bowl of kibble with prime rib all to herself and she dove into it like she never had her own bowl of food before. She had some medical issues and she had major digestive issues and we were outside with her as many as 13 times a night. There were many trips to the vet and one by one all her issues were resolved. We now have an incredibly happy, beautiful, and healthy furbaby. Kyla gives us so much love. She comes in for a hug and cuddles and falls asleep in our arms. She also has such a funny side to her. She'll tease Lexy to play then runs away and hides only to be peeking back around the corner. She sleeps upside down all night without moving an inch. She wakes us up with a roar that you would think there was a lion in the house. Lexy looks at her as if to say, "Really?" We want to thank the GR team from the bottom of our hearts for our little Kyla. She is finally 'home'.

BEHIND-THE-SCENES AT GOLDEN RESCUE FOSTERS

As we move into early spring, a time of year to plant the seeds that will blossom into beautiful flowers in the coming months, it is fitting that we are featuring Golden Rescue Fosters, who take Goldens in need and nurture them so they can blossom into their best doggy selves and for their future new families.

Once the intake team has completed the initial assessment of a new Golden, the next step is finding a foster family to take them in until their forever home is found. Sometimes this needs to happen quickly, which is why it is so important to have a lot of fosters in the network across Canada...and we are always working to grow the foster roster. As you read about in last month's newsletter, the intake team sends an eblast to the foster team, or in some cases, calls a local foster directly in an urgent situation.

Just like finding the right forever family, it's important for new Goldens to have the right foster family. Some are best without other pets in the house and some need people with time to help manage complex care...each case is unique. And sometimes we have little or no information, so the team makes the best decision with the information they have. As a foster, you have to understand what is best for you and the Golden. There is a foster and a future family for every Golden and the Golden Rescue team works hard to ensure finding the right fit.

The most important trait of a good foster is understanding that every Golden is different.

They each have different needs, challenges, and idiosyncrasies that aren't always apparent at intake. It takes patience, love, and flexibility to understand each new Golden. When welcoming a new foster Golden into a home, it is essential to be realistic and understand that what worked for another may not work for this one. Watching how they react, adjusting your approach, and remembering that you are giving them a safe, loving space can lead to remarkable changes in even a short period of time. For Goldens with health or behavioural issues, the Golden Rescue team has resources and experts to assist.

If you ask fosters what the best part of fostering is, most of them will say it's seeing a Golden learn 'how to be a dog'. Not all rescues come from bad situations. Some just need a second chance. Unfortunately, many have bad pasts and they have not learned the fundamentals or been given love and a safe haven. Things like walking on grass, using stairs, playing with toys or other dogs...these are some of the 'firsts' that our fosters experience with Goldens. It's a big reward; however, it's often a challenging task.

There are many reasons that people choose to foster with Golden Rescue. It's a great way to help Goldens in need, even if only for a short period of time. Sometimes that is the hardest part ~ looking at that beautiful, sweet Golden face and knowing they aren't staying forever! The term 'foster fail' is a funny one.


