


ONE'S A DELIGHT...ONE'S A DOLL!


Redd has a fascinating story...one of challenges but ultimately success. We were on a hiking trip in the UK when we received an email from Golden Rescue about the impending ban asking us if we'd like to adopt a Turkish Golden ahead of the ban. Redd touched down in Canada one day before we did. He spent the night with a foster and we picked him up the next day. Redd had both femur heads surgically removed before his arrival in Canada. He was emaciated, weak, and sporting two scars. And so began his physical recovery. He started a weekly regime of hydrotherapy, physiotherapy, and rehab. John had recently retired and quickly became Redd's primary person. Redd was reticent and fearful of everything from birds to garbage cans. He blossomed inside and quickly became the 'apple of our eye'. John began using Redd's profile picture on all his social media and they became inseparable. Over the next year, Redd gained strength and functionality and expanded his horizons. He made a few doggie friends and some of his fears of birds and inanimate objects lessened. Although he attended and progressed through obedience classes, his aversion to other dogs outside increased. His reactivity became hard to manage and we sustained redirection bites. We sought professional help but managing Redd on leash was very challenging. Around this time, John began exhibiting strange medical symptoms and managing Redd became too much for him as he progressively lost strength in his hands and legs. Sadly, John

was diagnosed with Bulbar ALS. Then Jane became Redd's primary person. His reactivity resulted in several falls which took some time to heal. John's diagnosis and rapid physical decline, our changed lifestyle, and Redd's limited success with trainers, prompted a chorus of concerned people telling us to surrender Redd back to Golden Rescue. John was resolute that Redd would improve and stopped any further chatter about his departure. We found a new trainer with experience and gravitas who instilled us with renewed hope. She reminded us that we get the dogs we need, not the dogs we want. She encouraged me to stop reminiscing about our previous 'easy' dogs and to focus on Redd. When we did that, we realized that we had received the dog we needed. Jane's 3-hour daily walks/training sessions with Redd was the respite that was needed. When we walked, I had to be very present and only focus on him and his reaction to the outside world. It allowed me to forget about life's other challenges. Redd has improved significantly and I've become part of a reactive fog walking group and he's becoming more confident and comfortable on leash in the presence of other dogs. Redd had been a constant for us through two years of personal change and challenges. He loves all John's caregivers and visitors. Redd is indeed the dog we needed. We are very grateful to Golden Rescue for giving us the opportunity to offer him a forever family.

BEHIND-THE-SCENES AT GOLDEN RESCUE

FOSTER ONBOARDING

Although, from the outside, it may seem like rescued Goldens smoothly move from the intake process to a foster family; however, there is a wonderful team of volunteers in between these steps who work hard to ensure that only the best foster families are onboarded. You may have seen our calls for more foster families, and just as a Golden is taken through an onboarding process, so are the foster families who answer our call.

What happens when an interested family completes the online foster application? The Foster Onboarding Team Lead receives the application and delegates it to one of Golden Rescue's fabulous volunteers. The volunteer immediately gets to work connecting with the applicant to email them the comprehensive Foster Guide that contains just about everything you could ever want to know about fostering a Golden. The volunteer will arrange a call with the applicant to interview them and answer any questions they may have. Ideally, if there is more than one individual in the home, all will attend this call to ensure everyone is on the same page. The volunteer will also follow up with the applicant's references. All of this can happen within the span of just a few days!


The next step is for the foster onboarding volunteer to contact the home visit team and they will arrange to have a volunteer visit the applicant's home to meet the potential future foster family to ensure it is a safe and good environment for a Golden (more on that wonderful team in a future issue). Once the home visit team

has confirmed that all is well, they will send a report to the foster onboarding volunteer who will then send the approved foster family our foster agreement and addendum with the twelve rules for becoming a Golden Rescue foster family.

One of the most important rules for future foster families is that they must agree to foster a minimum of three Goldens before they can be considered to adopt a foster in their care (you may recall from our April issue that being a 'foster fail' is not unusual). You may think it sounds easy to do, but there is a reason for this rule ~ once you see that sweet Golden face, your resolve may crumble! It's important to carefully consider this requirement before taking on the fostering role as the most difficult part of fostering is letting them go.

Once the foster agreement and addendum are signed, the foster onboarding team passes the baton to the foster mentor team (we will talk about foster mentors in the next issue of *The Guardian*) and they will reach out to the new foster family to begin their official journey of Golden care.

The key traits of a foster onboarding volunteer are being organized and remaining open-minded. The most difficult aspect of the role can be the wait...it is an extensive process for vetting a potential foster family and it can take people a while to consider all of the information and reach a decision. Though that can be frustrating, it is worth the wait as we only want Goldens



going to safe, loving fosters on their way to a forever family and this process ensures the right families are chosen. And the system works. When asked why volunteers have continued in this role for many years, they say that they love the organization, communication, and thoroughness of Golden Rescue's systems and it gives them confidence that they are truly helping Goldens in need.

Our wonderful foster onboarding volunteers love this role because the end result is knowing that they contributed to a Golden's journey to love, safety, and comfort.

Dear Goldie: I wonder how many Goldens do the BTR (bum tuck run). Some do it, some don't. One minute it's an average day, then all of a sudden 'I Feel the Need for Speed'. You know, from the movie Top Dog. Without warning, I suddenly jump up and do the BTR. Sometimes I do it outside, but it's best inside when I zoom around the room, motoring at full throttle in a tight circle with bum tucked in, fast dodging chairs, people, and anything in my way. Gales of laughter erupt or shouts of "look out, here he comes!". What Golden doesn't like to be smack-dog in the middle of the action? Not even sure what triggers the BTR. Do you know Goldie? Tucker

Dear Tucker: Your sudden bursts of energy to run at high speed through the house are actually called 'zoomies'. This behaviour is a normal form of play to burn off pent-up energy or to release excess excitement.

Dear Goldie: Roses have thorns. Although I have eyes that melt your heart and a sweet expressive face, my thorns are my windy puffs. Every night, when I eat dinner with

mom and dad, I gobble up my meal in record time. Then I go into sitting mode beside the table while occasional windy puffs sneak out the back door, with mom and dad fanning their noses in unison. To make matters worse, I even vocalize sometimes with a little squeak. Later, when we watch TV, I'm sometimes awakened by my windy puffs and deny that it could even be me while going into a contortion to get up close and personal for rear-end inspection. What's happening here? Windafrid

Dear Windafrid: You've given me a clue. Being a speed-eater can cause you to swallow excess air. Try these possible solutions and if they don't work, visit your veterinarian. Split up your normal food amount into two meals and try using a slow-feed dog dish. A daily scoop of probiotics added to your food might also help reduce gas by promoting a healthy balance of gut bacteria.

Dear Goldie: I've always had a passion for eating tissues, paper towels, and even do-do paper (unused of course). When we go for a walk, I'm always on the look-out for that magic white stuff. Tissues are so much fun to shred or swallow quickly when dad isn't looking. Why do I do this? Koleena

Dear Koleena: This may seem rewarding due to a prey or hunting drive, or maybe you started eating tissues as a pup, out of boredom, hunger

or anxiety. You may also be doing this to gain your owner's attention. A single tissue is unlikely to cause harm; however, if ingested in large quantities or frequently, vomiting or loss of appetite could signal a possible blockage. I'm sure your owner will keep tissues well out of reach and redirect you when spotting discarded ones on your walks. Try to restrain yourself. Surgery to get the stuff out is no fun.

Dear Goldie: Can we be serious for a moment? My name is Teddy and I'm a seasoned, well-adjusted rescue. Now, I'd like you to step back in time with me to better understand what my thoughts were as that frightened Golden awaiting a second chance. Here goes: Don't expect too much from me when I arrive. I'll need time and the benefit of the doubt. You will learn new things about me. I may carry a hidden secret, issue or fear, but please don't give up on me. If I make a mistake, correct me, don't scare me. Be patient even if it means altering your house rules for a short time. I desperately want to be a part of your life. I'm trying hard to fit in, learn new things, trust you, and earn your love. Here's my question Goldie ~ did I leave anything out? Teddy

Dear Teddy: Yes, you did. Your biggest hurdle when you reached your forever family was that you would not pee or poo in the backyard. You would only do your jobs on a walk. This continued until your owner had an ankle injury and briefly could not walk you. After one long day, you finally pee-ed big time in the yard while your mom watched and praised you from the back door. From that day on, all was good!





Balance For Success!

Balance is key to a happy, healthy, and well-adjusted canine companion and it means ensuring our dogs have neither too much nor too little of essential activities. It keeps them mentally and physically at their healthiest, preventing depression and anxiety. Our dogs are living, breathing, thinking, and feeling creatures and, as such, it is important to provide them with all kinds of positive stimulation in an environment that will help support and encourage their personal growth and success. This means creating a balanced scale in their life between vital areas that support this development including play, work, and rest. Often behavioural problems such as barking or digging indicate an imbalance in these areas which tells us that there's something missing. All are critical and should not exist without the other. Love and consistency are crucial in maintaining this balance in all activities and should be a critical part of everything you do.

Maintaining a balanced lifestyle for your dog involves a healthy mix of several factors, including exercise, mental stimulation, routine, and schedule ~ all underscored by a foundation of love and respect.

The simplest way to ensure your dog has a balanced routine is by establishing and maintaining a consistent daily schedule. Dogs do not recognize weekends or holidays and any deviation from their routine can cause them stress.

It is important to tailor your routine to fit both your and your dog's specific needs. Different dogs require varying amounts of each element in

the balance of play, work, and rest. As dogs age, the balance will gradually shift from less work towards more play and rest.

To determine the appropriate balance, consider what your dog was bred for.

For instance, a Golden will likely enjoy activities involving water and objects to fetch.

Teaching such behaviours can be an excellent means of providing exercise and engagement. Many breeds, including Goldens, thrive on pleasing their owners and are eager to learn new skills and behaviours that contribute positively to their development.

The routine I recommend includes periods of play, work, and rest. Playtime typically involves bathroom breaks and lasts for about 20-30 minutes. This period should include plenty of active and enjoyable play, allowing your dog to engage in natural behaviours such as running.

Work sessions should be short and focused and involve engaging your dog's brain through positive interaction and training exercises. These sessions should begin with affection, as it serves as both a reward and an indicator of what is to come. Training activities may include commands like sit, stay, walk on a loose leash, fetch, and focus. Many dogs thrive on using their minds in this way and love to learn and practice new skills. And if it means they get a huge helping of love and praise for being such a good dog for completing the task, then all the better in their mind!

Finally, rest is a crucial component of a balanced lifestyle. If your dog does not rest adequately after both play and work sessions, it indicates insufficient physical and mental exertion. Adjust the amount of play and work accordingly, ensuring that activities remain short, positive, and grounded in love. A tired dog is a happy dog, and rest allows them to reflect on their experiences, leading to the development of a

happy, healthy, and well-behaved companion. This approach fosters a deep and enduring bond between you and your dog, lasting throughout your lives.

It's important to keep in mind that as we strive to give the best of a balanced life to our pups, there are often challenges we face along the way. We are busy humans with busy lives in a busy world and with schedules that are constantly changing. Whether it be work, kids or friends, something always seems to interfere with our dog's need

for exercise and play. Activities like throwing a ball, running, walking, hiking or chasing a stick are essential to prevent behavioural issues. And like kids on a rainy day, if you don't have the time to exercise and play with them, you will pay with their (mis)behaviour in the end. So, once the dog has had their exercise and playtime and is sufficiently tired then I move on to work their brain's a bit. I focus on short training sessions lasting 2-5 minutes several times a day, which can be easily fit into even the busiest days. On days of transition, a quick training session and some play before a trip ensures a more pleasant journey with a tired and content dog.

All of these activities, when conducted on a regular schedule that fits the needs of everyone in your family, both humans and canine, and layered with a large helping of love, will go a long way towards creating a happy and healthy dog and fostering that deep and lasting bond between you and your furry friend.




