Winter Woes on Cold Toes

Cold, Ice & Snow:

Frozen sidewalks and icy patches can crack or dry out paw pads. Limit time outside during extreme cold and always wipe paws when your Golden comes inside. Particularly clean between the toes where ice and snow can build up.

Beware of Salt & De-Icers:

The chemicals used to melt ice can irritate paw pads and make pets sick if they lick their paws afterwards. Use pet-safe de-icing products at home and rinse or wipe paws after walks to remove any salt residue.

Gear up for the Winter:

Consider protective booties or paw balm to create a barrier against salt, ice, and cold. Have you heard about suspender boots? They are a great alternative to booties which many dogs dislike, pull off or lose in deeper snow. These boots provide secure paw protection and extended leg coverage and connect by a harness. They're adjustable and connected, which means you'll never lose a boot. And most dogs don't mind wearing them at all. In fact, how many of us go on walks in the snow and our Golden's have to stop to pull snow from between their toes because it's uncomfortable for them. These boots make walking in the snow comfortable for them.

Regular paw checks:

After walks, check for cracks, cuts or redness. Vitamin E cream is good for paw pads as it can moisturize and help heal dry, cracked pads. It's best to use a product that is all-natural. Apply a small amount and make sure it absorbs so it won't be licked off.

A bit of extra paw care goes a long way in keeping your pet comfortable through the cold months. When the snow piles high, let's make sure every step they take is safe, warm, and full of winter joy.

Ask Goldie

Dear Goldie: Sometimes all of a sudden, and unexpectedly, I look as though I've learned to sit down like mom and dad, and then it's "Rub a Dub-Dub, My Bum on the Rug". It's the dreaded bum drag. Goldie, why do I do this? It feels so good but it makes mom mad (especially if we have visitors). Doug

Dear Doug: Scooting is an infrequent, common behaviour where your Golden itches their rear end on the rug. This is a normal response to relieve minor discomfort from anal glands. Many Golden Retrievers never do it; however, if it happens frequently, it may require a visit to the vet to have their anal glands expressed or to rule out other conditions such as allergies or a gland abscess. Those would be a real bummer (ha-ha).

Dear Goldie: A Golden Rescue may arrive with a secret. When I was fostered and heard a knock at the door, I would bark and run in circles at record speed, all around the ground floor. One day my leash was left on the floor in a corner. Later, when the neighbour knocked at the door, I immediately gave my trademark bark,

ran and picked up my leash and took it to the door. Finally, the riddle was solved. My previous regular dog walker had taught me to fetch my leash when he knocked so he didn't need to come in the house. Now mom and dad always leave my leash within reach and when they say, "Wanna go walkies?" I bark and fetch it for them. Barker

Dear Barker: Yes, it becomes a learning experience and adventure when a Golden Rescue finds their forever family. It's so important that new pet parents identify and focus on their Golden's positive qualities and attributes. Don't let the positives take a back seat to an issue that can be addressed.

Creating a Lasting Legacy for Golden Rescue

A Simple Guide to PLANNED GIVING for Our Golden Angels

At Golden Rescue, our donors are called Golden Angels. Your compassion for Golden Retrievers and generosity continue to make a meaningful difference in so many ways, beginning with second chances, general care or paving the way for a new forever family. Through planned giving, you can extend your love and support far into the future, while also enjoying significant tax benefits that make your generosity even more impactful.

The journey can begin with a simple choice: Who will make the gift?

- Individual donors can claim a tax credit at the lowest tax bracket rate on the first \$200 of annual donations, with a higher credit on amounts beyond that.
- If you own a corporation, you might consider having your corporation donate directly to Golden Rescue. This approach allows the donation to become a deduction when calculating your corporation's net income. Both options can offset up to 75% of net income, with the flexibility to carry forward unused amounts for five years.

Your will or trust can include Golden Rescue

Many Golden Angels choose to remember Golden Rescue through their will.

- When you name Golden Rescue as a beneficiary, the tax credit can be claimed in your estate year, in any following year or even in the year before passing.
- This credit becomes especially valuable in the year of passing and the year before, when the maximum tax offset increases to 100%.

A charitable remainder trust

- Offers another beautiful option if Golden Rescue is the main beneficiary of your estate.
- This allows you to enjoy the tax benefits during your lifetime while knowing your legacy is secure.
- As the beneficiary at your passing, Golden Rescue receives a donation receipt for the current value of the property.

Imagine this: A Golden Angel who wishes to leave their home to Golden Rescue could donate

it through a charitable remainder trust now, continue living there for life, and use the tax credit to reduce annual taxes ~ all while knowing their beloved home will one day help rescue more Golden Retrievers.

Designating Golden Rescue on Registered Plans ~ your registered retirement savings plans (RRSPs) and registered retirement income funds (RRIFs) can become a powerful tool for supporting Golden Rescue.

- While these plans may owe tax if transferred to family members, naming Golden Rescue as beneficiary bypasses probate tax and donates the plan's full value. This generous approach offsets the income inclusion and any excess credit can reduce other income as well.

Similarly, your Tax-Free Savings Accounts (TFSA's)

- Can be designated to Golden Rescue.
- Without a spouse or family member to inherit the tax sheltering, naming Golden Rescue as your TFSA beneficiary ensures the full value goes directly to helping Golden Retrievers in need, while also bypassing probate tax.

Life Insurance as a Gift of Love ~ Naming Golden Rescue as your insurance beneficiary

When you name Golden Rescue as a beneficiary on your life insurance policy, we receive a donation receipt for the full amount, which can reduce tax in your final year. This creates a

lasting tribute to your commitment to Golden Retrievers. Another thoughtful option is to allocate the cash value of a permanent policy to Golden Rescue while preserving the face value for your loved ones ~ a way to honour both your family and the Golden Retrievers you care about.

Golden Rescue as Policy Owner

Some Golden Angels choose to have Golden Rescue own a policy on their life.

- You can either pay premiums directly to the insurer with our authorization or donate the premium amount to us so we can make the payments. Either way, you receive annual donation receipts that provide immediate tax benefits.
- Do you have an existing policy that no longer serves its original purpose? You can transfer it to Golden Rescue, creating an immediate tax benefit. We'll issue a donation receipt for the policy's cash value and we can ensure premiums are maintained so your gift continues to grow.

The Gift of Securities

When you donate stocks or securities directly to Golden Rescue, rather than selling them first, something wonderful happens.

- We issue a donation receipt for the full market value – you avoid paying tax on the capital gain.
- This means more support for our rescued Golden Retrievers and a larger tax benefit for you ~ truly a win-win for everyone, especially the Golden Retrievers!

- If you donate through your corporation, the benefits are even more generous. Your corporation can claim a deduction equal to the full market value and use the capital dividend account credit to provide tax-free dividends to shareholders.

Flexible Giving Through Donor-Advised Funds

If you'd like to maintain some flexibility in your giving, you can direct your gift to a charitable foundation that supports Golden Rescue. The foundation will work with you to ensure your wishes are honoured and some even offer donor-advised funds that allow you to have ongoing input about when and how your gift benefits Golden Retrievers.
